
# The Grenfell Mission

Dr Wilfred T. Grenfell came to the coast of Labrador in 1892 on behalf of the Royal National Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen. His job was to assess the living conditions and needs of remote fishing communities in Labrador and northern Newfoundland. His findings changed his life, and the lives of the people he served. Finding Grenfell tells the story of the many nurses, workers and volunteers who contributed to the success of the mission and its legacy.
